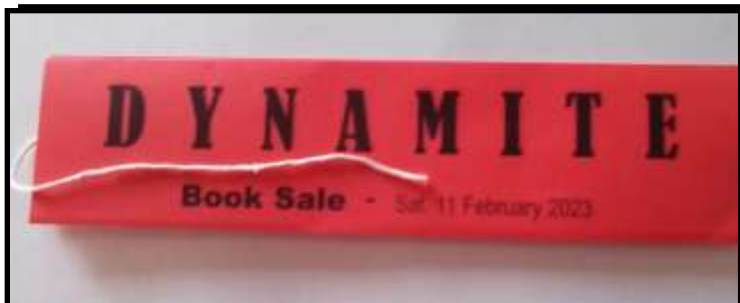

NSW RURAL FIRE SERVICE

Windellama Rural Fire Brigade

Brigade Activity

Last month the Brigade provided assistance to the NSW Ambulance and Police at a motor vehicle accident on Oallen Ford Rd. Three RFS units from the Windellama Brigade responded to the scene to help extricate individuals who were trapped in the vehicles and assist with traffic control. The RFS units were the first emergency service on the scene and immediately set up a safe perimeter around the accident, ensuring that the emergency services could safely work to assist the individuals involved in the accident. They worked closely with the NSW Ambulance and Police to provide support and assistance where needed.

The Windellama RFS Brigade's quick response and expertise in emergency situations was instrumental in ensuring that the individuals involved in the accident received the necessary medical attention as soon as possible and prevented any further accidents occurring.

The Brigade was called to a power pole on fire with the call coming in around 3am. Two units quickly responded to the scene. No one was injured and no property was damaged other than the faulty transformer.

These incidents serve as a reminder of the importance of having a dedicated and well-trained emergency service like the Windellama RFS to respond to emergencies at any time of the day or night and also a reminder for all of us to be vigilant on the road and to drive safe.

Grass Fire Risk

As we continue into summer, it's important for members of the Windellama community to be aware of the dangers of grass fires. These types of fires can spread quickly and are often caused by human activity such as carelessly discarded cigarettes, or machinery use.

During the summer season, grass and other vegetation become dry and more susceptible to fire. Even a small spark can ignite a raging fire that can quickly spread, endangering lives and properties. That's why it's essential to be prepared and take precautions to prevent grass fires.

- Clear any dry or dead grass and other flammable vegetation around your property.
- Keep a close eye on the weather forecast and be aware of the fire danger rating.
- Never leave campfires or barbecues unattended and make sure they are completely extinguished before leaving.
- Be mindful of any activities that may generate sparks, such as welding or grinding.
- By being aware of the dangers of grass fires and taking the necessary precautions, we can all work together to keep our community safe.

Windellama Landcare is alive and well as we move into 2023.

Windellama Landcare has received funding from Landcare NSW to commence work under the Riparian Restoration Program and repair some of the 2022 waterway damage.

We intend to commence the project in early Autumn, once the necessary material and trees are available. This project involves controlling creek bank erosion on two sites. The first is on tributary of Budjong Creek running parallel with Sandy Point Rd. The second site is a problem area of Budjong Creek near Miller Rd.



The project involves coir logs being installed at sites where the creek bank is collapsing into the watercourse. Hessian will be spread on bare areas of creek bed to reduce the erosive effects of rainfall.

To help stabilise areas adjacent to the eroded banks and reduce the water table 1,000 trees as tube stock will be planted. Only those eucalypts shown to be tolerant of future expected climate conditions will be planted.

This is an important project to save our local watercourses and will require lots of manpower. If you are interested to see erosion control being undertaken and would like to be involved, please contact John Pearce (0435 586 281) or Tony Greville on (0418 412 460).

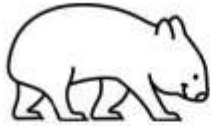

November 2022 Rainfall

November 22 saw an additional drop of 38mm giving us a total of 72mm for this month and a total so far for the year up to this month of 1061.50mm.

December 2022 Rainfall

A total of 48mm fell at our place making the years total for 2022 1109.50mm. I was expecting more rain than the total of 48mm for this month but it was not to be. So we did not better 2021 rainfall of 1146mm at our place.

January 2023 Rainfall

Up to the 18th of this month I have recorded 34mm. Last year in January we received 129.5mm. As I write this it has started to rain.

Weeds

Unfortunately, the great seasonal rains have germinated many different weeds Serrated tussock and the prickly thistles. I'm gradually, getting on top of the Scotch thistles and have reduced numbers but just maintaining Serrated tussocks numbers. At our place this weed is not exploding like on some properties.

I have tried one of the Organic sprays on broad leaf weeds with good results. Using, at 2 parts organic spray to one part water achieves good results on weeds like thistles. Actually, if it hits clovers they are also gone. Flat weeds and clovers just turn black very quickly but you must completely cover your target. It also knocks other grass weeds but takes a little longer.

Fruit Trees

The Cherries have been great, no extra protein or mould. However in the last few days cherry slug has attacked these trees, plus the pears and some plums.

The leaf curl problem I was concerned with has not worried fruit set, as there is plenty of fruit on most of these trees. This could be because I fed the trees when I noticed this problem.?

Vegetable Garden

The early tomatoes I planted in wicker buckets have fruit on them and are now over 1.5 metre high. As I wrote in the last newsletter, this is a trial to get early tomatoes. This has not been achieved.

The 4 seedlings I bought are growing, have fruit but also some leaf problems. The leaves which have problems I have been removing.

It's interesting, that the plants I started from seed, after I purchased the 4 Tomato plants, so far, are fine. Also they have caught up to the early ones I purchased.

The late ones I grew and planted out side in Early December at 6 inches high, are now 30 inches tall and have fruit on them.

Flower Gardens

The roses in pots on the Eastern side have flowered well but now that the temperature has increased the flowers are being cooked.

Bird Life

The Magpies that have been breeding in the pines for the last 2 years, built this breeding season as they normally do, high in the gum Tree. Does this mean we are back to hot weather and very little rain? Time will tell?



We had very few CFR callouts around the Xmas break, but that has changed drastically in January, I am sorry to say.

Two of our team members have been away most of the time at various flood affected areas and will be for the foreseeable future, unfortunately.

Our training schedule is as it was last year, that is, second and third Monday of each month for SES at 1830 hrs and the fourth Saturday of each month at 0830 hrs for CFR training, new members welcome for both activities.

We will open on Market days, where possible, throughout the year.

I was reminded to-day as to how dangerous a rather large stringy bark tree can be as I drove down a road on my property to gather some pre cut wood and found a tree across the road which I had travelled but 30 minutes earlier,

With the hot weather finally here mulch and water in the cool of the afternoon.

VEGETABLES;

It is important to start planting cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and Brussel sprouts. This enables them to get established before the cold weather. They need a soil containing plenty of compost and well rotted animal manure, also a light dressing of lime before planting. When these plants start to grow give them fortnightly feed of liquid fertilizer or Power Feed (fish,compost,seaweed, plant food).

Other vegetables that can be planted are carrots, parsnips, celery, kohlrabi, lettuce, parsley, radish, and turnips. Asian greens, beetroot, leek, chives, kale, silverbeet, spring onion, swede.

FLOWERS;

Plant seedling of pansies, viola, stocks, poppies, and alyssums. Calendula, carnations, polyanthus, larkspur, linaria, snapdragons, static and verbena. Hollyhocks, livingstone daisy, nigella.

This month spring bulbs appear in nurseries. This give you a choice of planning which bulbs you wish to grow, and to get your garden and pots ready for planting, for spring flowers.

Trim summer-blooming shrubs after flowers have faded.

Dig out and break up congested clumps of daffodils and jonquils before their bulbs start making new growth, then re-plant.

Clip off sunburnt flowers from hydrangeas but leave healthy blooms on the shrub to take on their attractive autumn colouration.

Keep camellias well mulched and watered at this time while they`re forming their new flower buds.

Weed after rains it softened the soil and the weeds come out more easier

Moth –repellent herbs.

In home orchard where apples and pears are grown, consider growing masses of herbal shrubs. These will add diversity and confuse aerial pests such as light-brown apple moth and codling moth. Choose two or more from lavender, santolina, rue, tansy, thyme, southernwood and pennyroyal. To keep them con -fined grow in pots

Moth-repellent bags made from the dried eaves of the same herbs can be placed in the wardrobe to keep moths away from clothes. Other sweetly scented herbs such as lemon verbena and balm of Gilead, as well as whole cloves and cinnamon, can be added for variety.

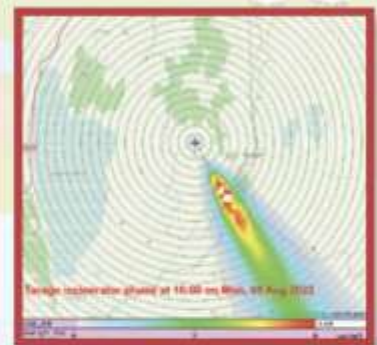

Our last meeting for 2022 was our Christmas party, which was held at Robyn and Rob's. vehicles onto the paddocks to spray the weeds, which have enjoyed magnificent conditions in which to stake their claim on our various properties and gardens over the last year or so.

In contrast, at the time of writing this article, we are getting a bit nervous about the potential for grass fires, as the land dries out and the grass cures. Hopefully, we'll make it through the fire season without any major fires in the area.
